



The Land



- Right triangle, borders: Alaska; Northwest Territories and BC
- Most of the territory is inside the namesake water-shed:
 The Yukon River.
- Canada's highest point, Mount Logan (5,959m or 19,551ft.)
- Kluane National Park & Reserve, UNESCO World Heritage Site
- Other national parks include:
 Ivvavik National Park and Vuntut National Park.
- Black & white spruce, and birch widespread tree species.
- Many trees are stunted because of the short growing season and severe climate – The Boreal Forest (taiga).

FIVE FACTS ABOUT YUKON'S MOUNT LOGAN

- With an elevation of 5,959 metres, it's the HIGHEST
 MOUNTAIN in Canada, and the second-highest in North America
- It's named after SIR WILLIAM EDMOND LOGAN, founder of the Geological Survey of Canada

- Its massif actually includes 12 DISTINCT PEAKS, the lowest of which, Teddy Peak, is almost the same height as the Eiger in Switzerland
- An international team of mountaineers led by Albert MacCarthy became the first to reach the main summit on JUNE 23, 1925
- In June 1992, an expedition led by geologist Michael Schmidt and sponsored by The Royal Canadian Geographical Society confirmed the height of Mount Logan USING GPS











The Water



- Southern Yukon is dotted with many glacier-fed alpine lakes, most flow into the Yukon River system, including: Teslin, Atlin, Tagish, Marsh, Lake Laberge, Kluane, and Bennett lakes.
- Other watersheds include the Mackenzie River, the Peel Watershed and the Alsek–Tatshenshini.
- A number of rivers flow north to the Beaufort Sea.
- Two large Yukon rivers flow into the Mackenzie
 River in the Northwest Territories (Liard and Peel).














Climate



- Average winter temperature is mild by Canadian Arctic standards
- BUT, no other place in North America gets as cold as the Yukon during extreme cold snaps.
- Temperature has officially dropped down to −60 °C (−76 °F) 3 times:
 * 1947, 1954, and 1968.
- The most extreme cold snap occurred in February 1947:
 - * Town of Snag dropped down to -63.0 °C (-81.4 °F).
- The Yukon's warmth tends to occur in May-July.
- The Mayo Road Weather Station, recorded the warmest temperature:
 - * 36.5 °C (97.7 °F) in June 18th, 2004.















Facts & Figures

History (in brief)



- Most of the Yukon escaped glaciation, common in western North America.
- Many Yukon archeological sites hold some of the earliest evidence of First Peoples occupation and history.
- Eruption of Mount Churchill, Alaska (~800 AD), blanketed the southern Yukon with a layer of ash, still visible along the Klondike Highway.
- Coastal and inland First Nations had extensive trading networks.
- First European incursions began early in the 19th Century for fur trading, followed by missionaries. By the 1870s and 1880s gold miners began to arrive.
- Population increases justified the establishment of a police force (NWRMP), just in time for the start of the Klondike Gold Rush in 1897.
- The Yukon Territory was formed in 1898, when the Yukon District left the Northwest Territories.




Facts & Figures

First Nations



- First Nations is ~25% of the population.
- An umbrella land claim agreement representing 7,000 members of 14 different First Nations was signed with the federal government in 1993.
- Eleven of the 14 Yukon First Nations have negotiated and signed comprehensive land claim and self-government agreements.
- The 14 First Nations speak eight different languages. The territory once had an Inuit settlement, located on Herschel Island off the Arctic coast. This settlement was dismantled in 1987 and its inhabitants relocated to the neighbouring Northwest Territories.


































Burning-a-hole:

Process of digging down to pay-dirt just above the bedrock.

A fire is built on the permafrost, as the ground thaws its removed.

Cheechako:

A novice or "green-horn" in the Yukon.

Overburden:

Non-gold-bearing dirt.

Pay-Dirt:

Gold-bearing dirt/gravel.

Skookum:

A First Nations word meaning strong.

Sluice:


A man made wooden channel, having ribs or slats on the bottom. Gold is caught in the slats, the dirt/gravel is washed away.

Sourdough:

A person that is considered seasoned in the Yukon.

A lack of bathing suits held-up the grand opening of the Dawson Amateur Athletic Association (DAAA) Pool in June, 1908.

For two weeks the new pool sat un-used while the new manager – Walter Creamer – awaited the arrival of the swimwear.





Klondike News – June 26th, 1908

"Dawson's metropolitan pretensions may have been recently strengthened by the addition of a freshwater natatorium. The water is taken from the Klondike and hence is pure and clean. It is changed every 24 hours and is heated to a comfortable degree of warmth by steam.

September 17th, 1900: Property was purchased


October 24th, 1902: Opening ball

• June 26th, 1908: Pool opened

Walter Creamer: Recreation Manager (RFT)

- In 1921 the pool was closed.
- Diving boards, slides and features relocated to a dredge pond at Crocus Bluff, used as the city's new swimming pool.
- In 1928 the pool was filled with dirt and old film reels.





1943:

A young girl named Marjorie Snare drowned in a dredge pond.




- A committee was struck under the leadership of Arnold Nordale to build a new open-air pool.
- The new pool was built with materials donated by the Yukon Consolidated Gold Corporation (YCGC).
- The finished pool (1945) even featured a small wading pool for young children.

 Film reels (1908-1920) - Rediscovered in 1978 and became internationally famous – The Dawson City Film Find Film: *Dawson City: Frozen Time*

Silent era nitrate film.









- The current indoor pool is built on the same location as the old outdoor pool.
- First filled by river water.
- Opened: November, 2000.
- It extends the swimming season, closing for the colder months.





Pool Manager

The Pool Manager is responsible for the overall day-to-day operations and maintenance of the pool which include the following;

- supervision and training of staff and volunteers
- implement all health & safety regulations
- education of community on safe water practices and the promotion of boat and water safety

Certifications:

- National Lifeguard Service, Water Safety Instructor, Lifesaving Society Instructor, Pool Operator Level I, CPR "C" and Standard First Aid or Aquatic Emergency Care.
- Certification in Pool Operators II, Aquatic Emergency Care Instructor, Water Instructor Trainer and NL Instructor/Examiner would be an asset.

Compensation:

Wages range from \$20-25/hour and many communities offer extra benefits, such as accommodations and a travel subsidy. Terms of employment: May to end of August.

The Yukon Government assists Yukon communities with the hiring of their staff. Communities are responsible for interviewing and hiring applicants of their choice. Pool Managers work for the community in which they are hired and are not Yukon government employees.







Drowning Death of RCMP Ruled Accidental

CBC News - November 7, 2012

- A coroner's jury in Yukon has ruled the drowning death of RCMP Const. Michael Potvin was accidental.
- Potvin, 26, from Osgoode, Ont., drowned in 2010 when the Mayo police boat capsized in the Stewart River.
- Potvin had been stationed in Mayo for less than a year, having graduated from the RCMP depot in 2009.
- While on the water, the motor stalled again. Chapman said he restarted it four or five times then stopped, because water coming over the back was flooding the boat. He started the auxiliary motor but it died as well.
- After a short time drifting, the now-swamped boat rolled over and both men went into the water. Chapman said he stayed with the boat while Potvin tried to swim for shore.
- A witness testified Potvin was swimming well and she thought he
 was going to make it to shore when suddenly his head and arms
 shot straight up and he disappeared. Another witness said Potvin
 yelled to others to help Chapman before he disappeared into the
 water.
- A memorial to RCMP Const. Michael Potvin, 26, who drowned in July 2010, was unveiled last year in Mayo, Yukon. (CBC file).



- A Sport Yukon Hall of Fame inductee and longtime hockey coach drowned after he went for a skate on Marsh Lake Sunday night.
- Jim Fowler headed out at about 7:30 p.m., telling his wife he'd be home in two hours.
- He never returned.
- A search began early this morning, and his body was recovered at about 10 a.m. in the lake near the Judas Creek subdivision, Kirsten Macdonald, the Yukon's chief coroner, told the Star.
- "There were no injuries, no suspicion of foul play," she said. "Just a terrible accident."





- The World Health Organization (WHO):
 "Drowning is a global burden."
- Third leading cause of unintentional death on the planet."
- Drowning is a significant concern in Canada.
- After birth defects, drowning is the main cause of unintentional deaths for children ages 1-4.
- Drowning is the second leading cause of unintentional death behind car crashes for persons under age 24.

World Health Organization (WHO) TEN ACTIONS TO PREVENT DROWNING

COMMUNITY SAFETY:

- 1. Install barriers controlling access to water.
- 2. Provide safe places away from water for pre-school children, with capable child care.
- **3.** Teach school-age children basic swimming, water safety and safe rescue skills.
- 4. Train bystanders in safe rescue and resuscitation.
- 5. Strengthen public awareness of drowning and highlight the vulnerability of children.

EFFECTIVE POLICIES AND LEGISLATION:

- 6. Set and enforce safe boating, shipping and ferry regulations.
- 7. Build resilience and manage flood risks and other hazards locally and nationally.
- 8. Coordinate drowning prevention efforts with those of other sectors and agendas.
- 9. Develop a national water safety plan.

FURTHER RESEARCH:

10. Address priority research questions with well-designed studies.




