

On April 19, 2023, we celebrated 30 years of service to Yukoners. Since then, 10% our dedicated staff and contractors have visited almost every Yukon community at least once. During our visits, we deliver programs like Cycle Smart or programs like APE or WAFL. We connect with recreation staff and volunteers, to learn what's working well and what isn't, and to help with whatever the community might need to engage their citizens in active, healthy lifestyles through recreation and parks.

Our Annual Report offers a glimpse into some of the activities and projects that have kept us busy. As well as regular programming, we supported community events with swag, fun games, information booths, and more. You may have seen us at the Carcross Tagish First Nation Health Fair or at Mt. Sima for the International Para-Snowboarding Cup. We were in Haines Junction for the Shana Natsat Spring Ski Celebration, Cul-De-Sac Bike Rodeo, and Career Fair. It was an honour to be invited to the Selkirk First Nation Culture Camp and the Teslin Sports Camp. We offered a Nordic walking leader training with the Canada Games Centre and helped out with the City's Bike Rodeo and the HopOn Cycling Program. Our Spike ball "See it, Try it" activities at the Fireweed Market were a hit, thanks to a ParticipACTION Community Action Grant, We also presented at the Association of Yukon Communities annual conference, at the Yukon Health Summit, during the Northern Dialogues conference, and to the Yukon Native Teacher Education Program.



So, what's new at RPAY?

In July, we welcome a new Special Projects Coordinator. Rebecca Koser, a born and raised Yukoner from Ross River, brings a background in aquatics and outdoor recreation/tourism. Rebecca will help with our new initiative supporting outdoor, unstructured recreation. As part of this project, we have already purchased and installed 9 Bike Repair Stations in communities and are working with Duncan's in Whitehorse to design and produce 'play boxes'. a fort-style shelter to house things like balls and hoola hoops.

We are looking forward to partnering with the YSPOR Unit at the Yukon Research Centre on the 2025 Yukon Healthy Living Study research project. This research will explore recreation patterns and preferences as well as food literacy and help us to adapt our programs and services to interests and needs across the Yukon.

I would like to acknowledge Lotteries Yukon for their steadfast support of our WAFL (Winter Active for Life) Equipment Library. Since 2018-19, industry standards for cross country skiing have changed and our WAFL equipment has aged. Yet, the demand for free loans of kick sleds, cross country ski, and snowshoe gear to rural and First Nation communities, and to underserved groups in Whitehorse, continues to grow. Last Fall, Lotteries Yukon approved a grant for upgrading the WAFL Equipment Library. The grant will let us retire old equipment and purchase 400 new pairs of boots, 300 sets of bindings, 48 new ski and binding sets, 19 new kick sleds, and some adaptative snow sleds. Watch for these upgrades next winter!
